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Bill Recap

- HB206 (Del. Webert) passed in 2022
- Requires mitigation for loss of prime agricultural soils and forest land
 - 10 acres of prime agricultural soils disturbed
 - -50 acres of forest land disturbed
 - Disturbance of land enrolled in forest land use taxation program



Bill Recap

- Required DEQ to convene stakeholder start regulatory process
- 84 workgroup participants in 2022
 - Ag/forestry organizations
 - Environmental organizations
 - Solar developers
 - Local government representatives



Bill Recap

- Much more manageable RAP in 2023
 - 1 more meeting left in 2023
- Draft regulations likely early 2024
- Final regulations adopted by December 31, 2024
- All solar applications to PJM before December 31, 2024 are exempt



HB206 Issues

- Agricultural Soil
 - Compaction and soil loss
 - Value of land itself
 - Economic value of crops
 - Conservation Value
 - Ecosystem Service Benefits
- Onsite mitigation/In-lieu Mitigation
- Mapping Both maps and ground truthing



HB206 Issues

- Forest land still forested land or harvested two years prior
 - Value of land itself
 - Economic value of timber
 - Conservation Value
 - Ecosystem Service Benefits
- Mitigation ratio and Forest Cores
- Easements versus In-lieu Mitigation



HB206 Issues

- Local Issues
 - DEQ Notification and Local Notification of NOI as soon as possible
 - Siting Agreements may allow for mitigation and will qualify for mitigation credit if it meets DEQ specifications
 - Mitigation as close to where the disturbance occurred as possible (based on watersheds)
